MACHINERY MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY OVERVIEW

The Machinery Manufacturing (NAICS 333) sector transforms metal into intermediate or end products, excluding machinery, computers, electronics, and metal furniture. NAICS 332 is a diverse and significant sector in the manufacturing industry. The activities involve a mix of forging, stamping, bending, forming, machining, and welding processes. The average annual wage in the NC, SC, and VA region is \$75,200, and 79,151 people work in the sector.

Top MSA by Employment Growth

The Raleigh–Durham–Cary MSA is the MSA with the highest annual growth at an average of 1.5% which is double the NC state average of 0.8%. Nationally, this industry has stagnated with no growth or loss. This MSA is also the number five employer for this sector in the tri-state region.

Industry Forecast

The machinery manufacturing industry is expected to grow at the rate of 0.6% per year over the next five years in the NC, SC, & VA region. An estimated 2,421 new jobs will be added. This is significantly less growth than was seen over the last five years when the sector added approximately 8,139 jobs.
